Thank you again to Lynn Besplfug and Kim Campbell for all the work they did to coordinate and advertise the event and thank you to West Vancouver Schools for their support in working with the Kay Meek Centre and in advertising the event. Finally, thank you to all the parents for supporting the event.

Traffic and Safety Committee – did not meet

Comprehensive Health Committee: Emily Lapkin & Kelly Richter

Both representatives attended. Emily reported. Comprehensive School Health Committee Meeting, May 29th 1-3 @ ILS

Physical Health

•An intercultural activities guide has been shared district-wide to help reduce barriers to physical activity.

A program called *Groove Edgeucation* was presented and tried out by attendees. It aims to help teachers engage students' bodies, brains and beings during classroom time.
It was noted that PE teachers are teaching BC health curriculum now in secondary schools.

Mental Health

The Foundry in North Vancouver opens soon. It's a province-wide network of integrated health and social service centres for young people ages 12-24, and the North Vancouver branch will soon be a one-stop shop for physical, mental health and social services for this age group.

SOGI (Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity)

•There are gender inclusive washrooms at every school now. Often same as handicapaccessible washroom.

•They let students take lead regarding this summer's Vancouver Pride March. West Van and North Van students will be marching together (opted not to do a float, too expensive).

Pre-Teen Programs

Young speakers program at the WVCC saw grade 6s and 7s speaking on issues they cared about. Topics discussed included: housing, sharing economy, youth spaces, self-driving vehicles. Students want more drop-in programs.

Teen Programs

Youth Services in West Vancouver is running a Summer Work Experience & Adventure Program - a 6-week job program for 10 young people, age 15-18. The program combines a week of work preparedness and training, followed by a 5-week summer job with local businesses, and some fun Friday outings (like kayaking and hiking). Application deadline was in late May.

Nutrition

•<u>TableMatters.ca</u> will be meeting again <u>on June 14th.</u> This North Shore group promotes farm to table initiatives, an edible garden project, teacher reps from our district are actively involved with community experts.

•Foods That Fit happened (showcasing hot lunch vendors who fit healthy lunches criteria), but the event was not all that well attended by PAC reps. It was suggested that next year, they hold it during a DPAC meeting and bring in food samples, etc.

Substance Use Prevention

Some voluntary CO testing happened at secondary schools, and a surprising percentage of kids blew a higher than normal reading, indicating tobacco or marijuana smoking.

Health-Related Speakers/Events

Spring saw a variety of well-received events throughout the district, including screenings of Screenagers documentary, body image presentations, and our own DPAC-sponsored Shimi Kang lecture on raising resilient kids.

Calendar Committee – did not meet

Human Resources Committee – Andy Franks

Registrations – approx. 700 in-district summer school registrations, just over 1000 out-ofdistrict registrations. Currently, 7220 students are registered for 2017-18 school year. Minutes are online.

Technology Committee - did not meet

DPAC website is in progress. Working site online for executive comment.

Board of Trustees Report – Carolyn Broady

- Last meeting on Tuesday, farewell to Dave Eberwein, looking forward to welcoming new assistant superintendent David Nelson
- Welcome back luncheon (will confirm date, usually last Wednesday of September). Please confirm your PAC executive and contact information so invitation may be sent out in late August, early September
- Staffing 10 new divisions in the school community
- Budget status quo budget, no changes, regular programming in place
- Question: with new divisions, is there going to be new building going on or portables? Answer: for the foreseeable future, will have portables in place

Superintendent's Report – Chris Kennedy

- Classrooms- with new class size language and strong enrolment, we have 10 new divisions between the following schools: Bowen Island, Westcot, Caulfeild, Chartwell, Pauline Johnson
- In Chris's time here, it has been common for 1 or 2 additional classrooms, 10 classrooms is very large, the school district has received \$1.25 million for portables/renovations
- Budget usually we run on a structural deficit, but this year, we have eliminated the structural deficit.
- Enrolment status quo or increased funding, district is pretty full in all schools, with maximum 20 students per classroom for Kindergarten, 22 students maximum per classroom for Grades1-3, no language for Grade 4 up, but we are capping it at 30 students.
- Increases in Learning Support, ELL, Library, more support for non-enrolling staff
- Looking towards Fall Grade 10-12 curriculum, will be fully implemented in the Fall of 2018, continuation of K-9 curriculum which was already implemented
- Testing regime shift, new FSA tests for Grades 4 and 7, will look different, will be given in October, will be using Grade 3 and 6 rubrics. In previous years, have used Grade 4 and 7 rubrics.

- High school exams, will see numeracy and literacy exams to be written between Grade 10-12, starting in year 2018/19, have not placed a limit yet on the number of times a student may write these exams. Also haven't determined what post secondary schools will do/how the exams will be weighted for admissions
- Place for Sport thank you for PACs for being so supportive, some sizeable donations are in the works, have about \$1 million, need \$5.6 million, hopeful that the fall will see increased momentum

Community Events Chris has attended this month:

- Playground initiatives new PJ playground/community park
- Coding Quest coding arcade at WV Memorial Library, partnered with Learning Partnership (organization based out east)
- Physical Literacy Amber Pasqual and Erin Crawford working side by side with elementary teachers on physical literacy piece for fall
