



## **BICS CODE OF CONDUCT**

Purpose – At Bowen Island Community School we strive to help our students develop skills that will result in socially responsible citizens. The school promotes the values expressed in the BC Human Rights Code respecting the rights of all individuals in accordance with the law – prohibiting discrimination based on race, colour, ancestry, place of origin, religion, marital status, family status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, and age – in respect of discriminatory publication and discrimination in accommodation, service and facility in the school environment.

Similar to the remarkable eagles that grace our island skies, we work hard to **SOAR** high in our behaviour and efforts to reach our potential. We utilize the following acronym to represent the expectations we have of all members of our school community:

- **S.** Safety...we make choices that are safe for ourselves and others.
- Ownership...we own our ability to learn and are responsible for our own behaviour.
- **A.** Attitude...we work hard to be positive, cooperative and helpful to others.
- **R** Respect...we respect the environment, ourselves, other people and their property.

**Expectations –** Students are expected to act in a safe and supportive way, caring for each other and showing respect for those around them. This includes understanding the role of the bystander or witness and their responsibility to preserve and promote school safety. These expectations apply to behaviour at school, during school-organized or sponsored activities, and behavior beyond these times (including online behaviour) that negatively impacts the safe, caring or orderly environment of the school, and/or student learning. Please note that special considerations may apply to specific students if they are unable to comply with a Code of Conduct expectation due to having an identified disability of an intellectual, physical, sensory, emotional or behavioural nature.

Home and school must share the responsibility for teaching children appropriate behaviour. By working together, we can foster a positive environment conducive to learning.
