- We need to rethink careers: 65% of kids in schools today will work in occupations that do not yet exist. (Dr. Kris Magnussen, SFU)
- George Couros, Author of The Innovator's Mindset, says "To innovate, disrupt your routine" and how teaching needs to evolve with the changing world
- The new K-12 Curriculum is leading the way in meeting the rapidly changing needs of students; Post secondary needs more time, and is thankful for the delay of implementing the 10-12 curriculum as they work out how it will align with their admissions process.

BCCPAC DPAC Summit

- Again, a lot to be proud of in BC Public Education

Make Movement Matter

Physical Literacy Project, Kindergarten – Grade 3

Why Physical Literacy?

Today's children may be the first generation to have a shorter life span than their parents. We want to change that.

 Get students to be confident, competent movers so they will be motivated to stay active for life.

Born to Move

- Better brain, muscle, bone, heart, body, social life, low burden to society
- Coordination, agility, stamina, strength

Impact on Human Development

- Get started on a base of skills, will soon translate to a host of sports/activities, and translate eventually to professions/jobs
- It doesn't just end with the sport
- Movement anywhere anytime
- Weaving movement into the day allows students to manage their energy levels.
- Cognition (brain development) and emotions improve with movement.
- Social emotional wellbeing

We want to continue to build on current good practice but now include movement.

Equal importance: literacy, numeracy, physical literacy

Alignment with the new BC Ministry of Education Physical and Health Education curriculum

- Physical literacy assessment examples (report card)
- Rethinking the environment, less clutter, toned-down classroom, classroom design is intentional

Physical Literacy Assessment for Youth

• www.play.physicalliteracy.ca and www.canadiansportforlife.ca

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- Pre-assessment for all students K-3 Canadian Sport for Life: run there and back, hop, overhand throw, kick ball, balance walk (toe to heel) backward
- Assessed 1700 children
- Developed at University of Manitoba and deployed by Canadian Sport for Life
- Tool has a very good to excellent reliability, strong validity, easy to interpret and very sensitive to change
- Agility, balance and coordination
- End with a post-assessment in spring

Teacher Support

- Specific movement prep to build durability and strength
- NCCP? Certified course
- Access to new and improved make Movement matter website
- Weekly WOW lesson plans
- Provide electronically to each teacher in YouTube clip format
- Delivered on Thursdays to allow teachers to plan and prepare the following week

- Pair skills development with appropriate season and sports (ie, running skills with track and field or cross country season)

Next Steps
