Principal's Report

Laura Magrath – 10 mins

- Orange shirt day There will not be an assembly because of Terry Fox run, but orange shirt day has been announced everyday over intercom.



- o Hot Lunch Day The kids very excited, as the first hot lunch day is pizza day.
- Dance Instruction- The group is coming next week and there will be a presentation at the end of the week at 1:50pm. Parents are encouraged to come support the kids. Teachers will also get dance instruction, but will not be performing.
- Student Council The kids and teachers are very passionate about it. The students started a petition to form a student council.
 - Now that everyone is settled, we will do a vote in each class for how many council members
- Spirit Wear day is coming soon
- Cross country track Chartwell won 2 ribbons. The students were super excited. The office received 4 emails saying how amazing our students were. They were very encouraging and helped other kids that were struggling through the race.

Areas of Focus:

Physical Literacy - Opportunities to Move and Connect

D DOPAMINE	 WHAT IS IT? Motivates you to take action toward your goals, desires, and needs, and gives you a surge of reinforcing pleasure when achieving them. HOW DO YOU GET IT? Break big goals down into little pieces so you can create a series of little finish-lines which releases dopamine. Recognize accomplishments of your team to show you appreciate them.
O OXYTOCIN	WHAT IS IT? Creates trust and strengthens relationships. Referred to as the LOVE or CUDDLE hormone. HOW DO YOU GET IT? Social connection. Give someone a gift. Give someone a hug (try for 8 hugs a day).



S SEROTONIN	 WHAT IS IT? Serotonin flows when you feel significant or important. HOW DO YOU GET IT? Gratitude practices help remind you that you are valued and significant. Although too much ultraviolet light isn't good, some daily sun exposure is healthy for boosting your serotonin levels.
E ENDORPHINS (EXERCISE)	 WHAT IS IT? "Runner's High". Endorphins are released in response to acute pain and stress, to help alleviate anxiety and depression. HOW DO YOU GET IT? Daily Exercise releases endorphins. Laughter.

Framework for Enhancing Student Learning:

At Chartwell our school goal is for students to be able to communicate their ideas more effectively through personal writing focusing on meaning and form.

Writing – In an effort to consolidate and become more focused, we landed on narrowing it down to personal writing.

Indigenous Education Plan - First Peoples' Principles:

Learning ultimately supports the well-being of self, the family, the community, the land, the spirits, and the ancestors.

Term 1: self (goal setting, resilience, fitness, responsibilities)

Term 2: community (holiday celebrations: Christmas, Chinese New Year, Nowruz; Pink Shirt Day)

Term 3: land and ancestors (earth day, multicultural week)

- Facilities: self-regulation downstairs
 - Self-Regulation Space Downstairs The older kids needs a space to down regulate- right now it is in the middle of all the classes that is really chaotic.
 - Break-out rooms for small-group instruction and meetings lots of opportunities to support teachers in creating more breakout meeting rooms.
 - Flexible seating in classrooms and in Learning Commons (movable and foldable tables)- We want to
 make sure the teachers have flexibility, but teachers are asking for more flexible seating options (tables,
 etc). Intermediates are doing well with higher seating and different types of spaces.
 - o Varied instructional spaces: outdoor learning spaces, community garden
 - Indigenous garden with Sentinel: Sentinel wants to do an Indigenous garden that is shared with



Chartwell. We applied for an innovation grant and we received some money to create a learning experience outdoors. There is a great south facing area where we could add some indigenous plants that will be easy to maintain.

GO Slow – We want to make sure that the changes we are making last a long time, far past when any of us in the room are still around.

■ Buddy bench — A student can sit on the buddy bench if they need a friend. Mrs. Magrath spoke with director of facilities to understand the cost of this project.

Emergency Preparedness – Classroom Grab and Go Bag – District is trying to tighten up some of the regulations

We need to spend time and money – we are not up to snuff

Putting out it out there that it needs to be upgraded

Assessment Principles: How are we assessing our students

FYI New Core Competencies: All of our curriculum and core competencies have now gone live on the website Under www.curriculum.gov.bc.ca

- Emergency kits Inventory of the emergency container was completed last June for outside bin.
 - o Indoor Classroom emergency grab and go bag for each classroom
 - Purpose: portable emergency kit to be used in the classroom or during evacuation, containing short term safety and supply items
 - Location: every classroom, and, commonly used teaching spaces (library, gymnasium, music room, lab, etc.)
 Stored in: easily carried units such as backpacks / 2-handled duffle bags / rolling containers
 *Ideally teacher can carry and still be hands free
 - What are we missing? We need a clear inventory of targeted things.
 - We would like volunteers to help with this.
 - Purpose of the inventory last June was to understand what had expired and what we need to add to the bin.
 - A new strategy was implemented for emergency situations of teachers using signs to signify if they are in need of help or if they are okay.
 - When comfort bag was done away with, it was not replaced with grab and go bags.
 - Common shared language and alignment on these goals is work in progress.
 - Viki will ask at DPAC what other PACs are doing when it comes to grab and go bags.

Proposed Grab and Go Bag Contents:

- First Aid kit compact kit containing a class set of various sized Band-Aids, various sized gauze pads, alcohol / antiseptic pads, adhesive tape, tweezers, vinyl gloves, First Aid Guide)
- foil emergency blanket 1 per student / teacher
- plastic rain poncho 1 per student / teacher



- flashlight batteries + 1 replacement set of batteries
- nutritious snack bars (fruit bar, or peanut free granola bar) 2 per student
- writing kit 1 notepad / 3 pens
- teacher identity garment (options: vest / t-shirt / armband / hat)
- crowbar 1
- leather work gloves -1
- dust masks 1 per student / adult
- clipboard with class list, name and phone number in pocket protector for inclement weather
- Optional: student activities playing cards / compact games
