School Garden – Tamzyn Jones

Harvest Bin Project proposal from BC Fruits & Veggies Program

- Planning and harvesting a school garden is a hands-on, place-based learning opportunity, offering direct connections to Food Science/Home Economics curriculum, along with cross-curriculum connections to Life Skills, Science, Art, Social Studies, and Sustainable Resources.
- Students connect directly with a local farmer, their local garden centre, and local agribusinesses, reinforcing the role of agriculture in their communities.
- It allows teachers to take the classroom outdoors, giving them resources and tools to initiate a school garden as a long-term project.

To get started with the garden, each school is provided with the following:

- Harvest Bin Project teacher's guide with planting and growing tips
- 5 portable raised beds heavy blue plastic bins, each 1.2 M x 1.2 M x 0.6 M
- A gift card to take to a local garden centre to buy 2 yards of soil, plants, seeds and items to get started.

At the start of the project, a BCAITC representative, along with a farmer, will visit your school to conduct a start-up workshop to demonstrate how the project works and to get you and your students up and running with your garden.

Once you and your students have decided what you want to plant, you then plan an excursion to your local garden centre to purchase seeds using your BCAITC gift card. You are given the freedom to plan your own garden, which gives students the complete farm experience, as every harvest offers its own challenges and rewards.

Teachers are asked to submit mid-season growing highlights with photos, and in June, a year-end report on the project

- 3 year commitment from school administration
- Teacher led team (minimum 2 people)
- Outdoor space + water source
- Parent/student volunteers to water over the summer
- We have to apply by Dec 15th at 5pm
- Have a spot, but are unsure if it is big enough
- We have \$3000 already ear-marked for a garden project, but this program is free. We could potentially us that money for collaboration time for teachers who are leading these groups

• What grades and when, will be determined. There will possibly be a buddy program system with the older and younger kids

<u>Committee Reports</u> <u>Human Resources – Andy Franks</u> Bargaining 2019

• Both the WVTA and WVMEA union agreements expire on June 30, 2019 and that either party could force the other to commence bargaining as early as the end of February, 2019.

a. Support Staff

- On the support staff side, the Provincial Framework Agreement has been completed and agreed at the provincial level. Now local unions will choose to incorporate that framework into their local bargaining discussions. The Board had approved of their support staff bargaining plan that morning and that it would now be submitted to BCPSEA for approval. Once the approvals are received, the hope is to commence and conclude support staff bargaining as expeditiously as possible.
- The provincial framework agreement has a provision which allows support staff members to honour a teacher picket line and still receive 75% of their wages. However, for this provision to come into effect, the support staff collective agreement must be concluded. This obviously causes a great deal of anxiety for our support staff and we would like to have a signed agreement to alleviate this concern.

b. Teacher

- The BCTF has been requesting that the parties commence bargaining early. However, many new trustees were recently elected and do not have much of a frame of reference for the bargaining process or issues. BCPSEA is holding its Annual General Meeting in January. At that meeting, trustees will be provided with information about the bargaining plan. Provincial bargaining will not commence until the conclusion of the AGM.
- There is no ability to conclude a collective agreement locally with teachers. This right lies with the designated bargaining agents at the provincial level. For this reason, locally we will only start bargaining after the commencement of provincial bargaining.

Teacher Recruitment:

- Current teacher recruitment is related to current or new absences. All of our full year positions have been filled. For teachers, we have future maternity leaves and medical leaves.
- We are continuing with our TTOC recruitment. To date, we have not had any shortages but we are continuing to add TTOCs to our list to ensure we are able to meet demands.
- Support staff recruitment is similar to teacher recruitment. The vacancies we have now are a result of new leaves/resignations. We continue to recruit casuals for Education Assistant, custodial and clerical positions.

Other Recruitment:

- New Facilities Manager Dmitri Eliasov. Dmitri brings a wealth of knowledge of facilities management experience, having worked as a Mechanical Engineer and a ticketed plumber.
- Temporary Communications Officer Jessica La. Tricia Buckley continues to oversee communications. Tricia will retain some of the role but Jessica to focus primarily on social media aspect of what Ms. Pausche did.
- Elementary Principal interviews this week. There are no current vacancies but this will create a pool of potential candidates in the event of retirements or staff changes.

Board of Trustees Report – Nicole Brown

Congratulations to West Vancouver Community Award winners from last Thursday night (Nov 29).

- Kyra Smiljanic and Victoria Mendes won for their efforts to develop PJ Outdoor Learning Park.
- Hey Jung Choi was also recognized for her volunteerism throughout our community and our schools with her wonderful talent as a pianist.

BCSTA – BC School Trustee Association had its first Conference since the election.

- Approximately 47% board turnover so the focus of this 3-day session was heavily on orientation.
 - Presentations by various employee associations such as BCASBO (Assoc. of School Board Officials), FNESC (First Nations Education Steering Committee), BCSSA (School Superintendents Assoc.), etc.
 - Sessions on parliamentary procedures, conflict of interest, improving media relations, motion submissions, etc.
 - WV Board of Education also has a new trustee: Lynne Block
- Minister of Education Rob Fleming and Deputy Minister Scott MacDonald both attended.
- Ministry of Education Funding Review update from the Ministry on the status of the funding model review process. Review of the three key themes identified by the independent review panel:
 - 1) Financial Management
 - 2) Equity of Opportunity how monies are used to support student achievement and tracking practices
 - 3) Accountability clear understanding of where we are going an dhow to move forward as a system. Discussions about not just how much money in the system but how well students are doing in it.

• From our West Vancouver Board perspective – we want to have input about the new model and be able to share it with our stakeholders and identify challenges before it is implemented. So far, we have not seen a proposal, there has just been discussions. We shall see...

Enrollment Report

• About 76% of students enrolled are from West Vancouver, Bowen Island and Lions Bay. Remainder from other districts such in the Lower mainland.

International Students

- decision made in 2015/16 and renewed for subsequent years to decrease enrollment for international students.
- Current enrollment is 529 students, which is 7.2% of the student population

- Challenge to find homestays, other accommodations
- Current numbers of international students manageable, good ratio of international students and local students in schools.

Trends

- Every year, enrollment down for in-district students in West Vancouver
- We are retaining more students over independent schools
- Overall numbers are going down due to housing, affordability, housing, etc. there are fewer young families
- We are the only district in the province to start with the fewer kindergarten students, and then enrollment goes up as parents can afford to move here
- North Vancouver enrollment in the district has been going up over the years
- Closer to Taylor Way, more diverse the population (increased number of out-of-district)
- As one moves west, increasing numbers of West Vancouver only population
- Families will travel for French immersion or Montessori
- We would need to close 4 schools if we only relied on West Vancouver population

Staff challenges – affordability for teachers to live on North Shore

Childcare can be addressed

Usually teachers can get their children in their school, no "special" consideration, apply as out of catchment or out of district

- Video West Vancouver Schools Our Story
 - o good general video used overseas, student story
- Oldest program in Canada, began in 1982
- Team full service administrative team
 - Handles marketing and recruitment, admission, homestay, custodianship, med insurance, exit requirements, provides school support
- Benefits: \$8.0M+ revenue to the District, additional \$11M to the community
- Internationalizes our campuses, supports Canada's reputation overseas
- Supplies the post-secondary system with high-performing students
- International Education Programs office handles both foreign nationals that pay full program fees and foreign nationals that are exempt from full fees by federal government permits
- Exempt: work permit, study permit, diplomat, refugee. Exempt status require paperwork approval and monitoring
- Fee paying foreign nationals are invited to Canada by West Vancouver Schools and permitted by federal government
- May study 5 months, 1 year, many years
- Diversity of markets: South Korea was major trend in 1990s-2000s, China is the mega-trend, Italy Vietnam, Brazil, Japan, germany are important diversity markets
- Approximately 80 students enrolled at the elementary level, approximately 450 students at the secondary level

- We have an English requirement for students in high school IL (test for students wishing to graduate)
- Assessment reassess English language skills and what courses most suitable
- 5 month minimum time commitment for students
- Early intervention with homestays and school adaption
- 37 different countries
- Decline in fee paying students, blend of ages, genders, good size for program now
- Ideal mix of students (country pie chart)
- International students do not displace domestic students local students first priority
- Does not include fundable students
- Balance programming, availability, vs international students
- International secondary students can choose to have a homestay through the WVS international ed program office or choose private accommodation
- International elementary students must have a parent staying with them
- WV Program fee is \$15,400 is program fee, Vancouver fees are highest

- Homestay process/accommodations -2 coordinators (in house homestay and private accommodations)
