LITERACY HIGHLIGHT

The PAC has spent \$4,696 on literacy this school year. Here are some of the book highlights:

- Anything is Possible: Tale about a pragmatic wolf and an imaginative sheep. Anything is possible through friendship and perseverance even a flying machine.
- Amy Wu and the Warm Welcome: About welcoming a new student from China.
- Shapes and Patterns in Nature: Discover the many patterns found in nature and learn what each pattern can tell us.
- What Are Words Really? Gentle reminder that words have power—the power to hurt or to heal, to make someone feel small or feel tall.
- The Girl Who Never Made Mistakes: Must read for any young (or old) perfectionist. It's ok to be perfectly imperfect.

TECH TALK

These are some of the iPad resources used in the classroom:

EPIC BOOKS

- Used in small group exploration.
- Students wear headphones and a book is played.
- Students follow the words as they are being read to.
- Answer quizzes, collect words and earn badges.

RAZ-KIDS

- Allows students to read books at their own level.
- Students can record their reading, which is used to assess for fluency.
- Comprehension questions at the end of stories to check for understanding.
- Used at a literacy centre where 4-5 students are independently reading.
- Allows teachers to support smaller groups for targeted literacy instruction.
- PAC purchased licenses for all students.
- Students receive their account information once their teacher has set them up (age appropriate), so that they can access it at home.

BOOK CREATOR

- Used for literacy and inquiry.
- It can be used to demonstrate learning in a creative way.
- The grade 3's have used it to showcase their Genius Hour projects where they were inspired to research a topic of interest and had a choice to present it over Book Creator or on a poster to the class.
- Create a biography research project on a famous leader of their choice.
- Share their work and allows students to learn skills such as importing photos, changing backgrounds and fonts, and utilizing the voice recording.
- Resources: West Van Digital & World Book Online.
- This is available to Grade 3's and they can use a QR code to login to their account at home.
- Allows them to research age-appropriate materials.
- Students can also record their own voice clips and add it to their book.

SHOW ME

- Kindergarteners use this tool to draw and record stories (including scribble writing).
- Build communication skills by explaining their learning.
- Recordings allow the teacher to see the progress they've made in their oral speaking skills over time.

FUNDING FUTURES

SPIRIT WEAR FRIDAYS

The PAC discussed whether we should re-open the spirit wear store. N. Quilty has added a few new options to the store such as pullovers, long sleeve shorts, joggers, 2 toned sweatshirts, and accessories such as hats and toques. Decided that we should reopen the store as soon as possible so parents can purchase the gear designed for colder winter months. N. Quilty agreed to put a notice in the newsletter.

DPAC TECH TALK – S. Slater

S. Slater presented the DPAC technology talk that was given by Superintendent Chris Kennedy. The presentation shared technology tools used in our district school. There are multiple tools being used to cater to different learning styles. Instead of one app that applies to all students, we have lots of options.

Chris Kennedy discussed helpful math app's that can help enhance math learning such as the Khan Academy app and the Prodigy math game app which both cater to kids from K-12.

The goal of the district is to prepare our children for the world they are entering, not the world we came from. We often wonder why the education system is different for our children than the experience we, parents, grew up with. Lots of parents feel out of their comfort level especially once students get to high school. It has been a long time since most parents learned the subjects that are being taught to their children.

E portfolios (like Seesaw) are available to parents. Seesaw is for the primary grades; however, google classroom is available for the later grades (grade 4 onwards). More assignments can be done online. Google classroom is a tool for students, and a communication tool for families. Parents can login and get a sense of what their child is working on. It is helpful for parents to be involved in their children's high school experience. Primary school parents are very involved, but in high school students are learning independence. These e-portfolios can be used for students to learn independence and to give parents awareness of their child's progress, deadlines, and subjects. See below for an overview of some of the technology tools used to benefit students and families:

Google Classroom

Most assignments get uploaded in Google classroom. This will be a soft start in grade 4 and gradually increases as students get older. Calendars are added at the district level for various activities. Students can subscribe to these calendars to keep up with events. There is a "Club Connection" Page to discuss the 70 clubs across the district. This is the tool used for communication between student and admin. Classroom lessons and videos are uploaded for students to access. Parents will need to understand how to navigate this tool if they want to get a better understanding of what their child is working on. In addition, there are helpful reminders for project deadlines.

Digital Citizenship

The goal of the district is to teach kids how to be responsible with technology, recognizing, it also starts at home. The West Van district website has a section called "digital citizen hub" with tools and resources to equip parents with facts and tips on teaching their kids digital citizenship: https://sites.google.com/sd45.bc.ca/digcit/ho me?authuser=1 Tips for parenting Digital Natives hand out as well as Family Device Agreement.

Students are taught how to keep passwords private. Students between grades 4-7 are considered "the sweet spot" for teaching them about digital citizenship. Students still think

adults know more about technology. By Grade 8, they typically think they know best - so there is a learning window.

Provincial technology announcement

Recently the Province announced that schools would be implementing new rules around cell phone use, and around holding social media companies more responsible. As it currently stands, S. Slater noted that all schools are already required to have an admin policy regarding technology use in schools. West Bay and Cypress Park have a policy in place which has been implemented since 2018

(https://westvancouverschools.ca/wp-content/uploads/2015/08/Administrative-Procedure-370.pd f). It states that "without the permission of the administrator / teacher, mobile devices are not to be operated during regularly scheduled instructional time, or during any school sponsored activity such as an assembly or talk by a guest speaker."

This is an existing issue and there are already tools in place and guidelines. S. Slater noted that at West Bay, students are asked to put their cell phone in a phone locker at the start of the day and are given their phones back at the end of the day. This may look different at secondary schools, but it is unlikely it will look like a ban, and more likely this is an opportunity to develop healthy habits around cell phone use.

ADMIN UPDATE – C. Hulme

The district physical literacy experts visited Cypress Park. They gave strategies for brain breaks for both students and teachers. One strategy has already been very effective and includes taping a square outside each classroom which can be used as a target for students to kick a ball into until they are ready to re-join the classroom.

There are lots of exciting field trips happening at Cypress Park. The grade three's recently went on a field trip to the North Vancouver Museum. It was a very positive experience. Three other classes are going on fieldtrips to Science World. The grade three class will be going on a skating fieldtrip with West Bay students. Another class will also be visiting the Lynn Valley Ecology Centre.

Teachers attended an IB conference last weekend.

A Saleema Noon educator will be visiting the school to give body science workshops to the students. On February 5th, there will be a virtual session for parents to learn about the topics being presented to each grade. Then on February 9th, 4 separate sessions will take place (one for each grade). Parents can access more information on the Selima Noon website. Saleema Noon educated the Cypress Park and West Bay students every second year.

There will be a lacrosse session for the students on February 7th. C. Hulme has also reached out to a fencing club to see if it would be possible to have someone teach the Cypress Park students.

The West Vancouver Police traffic department has been helping remind the community to drive slowly in the school zone.


