APPROVAL OF MEETING MINUTES

N. Quilty reviewed the meeting minutes from April 2024. The approval of the minutes from the April 2024 PAC meeting was motioned by C. Antoni-Wilkinson and seconded by M. Mohajerani. All members were in favour. The April 2024 PAC meeting minutes were approved.

IB UPDATE

Mrs. Anderson provided the IB update.

Next year (April 2025) we are undergoing an evaluation as part of the IB process. We will have IB evaluators at Cypress Park. We have been undergoing evaluations through self reflection. We started this year, and it will be a large part of our year next year. It is large feedback giving, supportive process that looks at all parts – environment, culture and learning practices. Every IB school goes through this evaluation every 5 years. Staff are going through assessment and inclusion policies and updating and reflecting. Doing a self study questionnaire – where do we think we are in terms of assessment and resources. It is collaborative and in-depth process. The school is looking for parent involvement. The school is hoping to create a focus group of interested parents that can be reflective and give feedback to move the school forward. The focus group commitment would entail meetings once or twice in the fall. There will be questions about the culture and environment. The evaluators are at the school for 2 days, observing classrooms, teachers and at the school district. They may also want to meet the parents to get their feedback and perspective. Can always contact Mrs. Anderson for more details.

R. Vernon, R. Yada, E. Baldwin, N. Hincks and M. Mohajerani volunteered to be on the parent committee/focus group. If anyone has any questions, or is interested in joining the parent group, contact Mrs. Anderson.

- R. Yada asked how IB is doing in the world how is it progressing, is it becoming more popular? Yes, it is very progressive, lots of teacher professional development. It is constantly changing and evolving and is very collaborative. We have the framework of IB worldwide you could go to another IB school around the world and the framework would be similar.
- J. Calleja how much flexibility is there to infuse IB into the curriculum? It is a different value system it is a framework and philosophy of a student driven format of learning. There is a common language. We embed the curriculum within that framework. Teachers have planning time and additional training to execute.

The students have been working on making their own learner profile posters. They are using indigenous animal puppets on the posters to represent the learner profiles. There was a representative from the Squamish Nation teaching students about some of the language. The classes made presentations about the animals. Students and teachers collaborated on the sentences. Students then picked pictures.

2024/2025 BUDGET

- N. Quilty reviewed the proposed budget for the 2024/2025 school year. She reviewed the current actuals and the projected budget for next year. A few items noted:
- The gaming grant has been submitted, and the PAC is hoping to get the grant for next year.
- The Whole Foods Grant helped pay for earth bites, but now doing this through feeding futures.
- The DPAC lets the community know when grants are available.
- Next year N. Quilty will purchase Isetta cards, and then sell them to the PAC to help promote the Isetta PAC kick-back program.
- Holiday planters are a lot of work, and there were no volunteers so that program has been cut.
- Experts in residence expense has increased.
- The PAC is going to bring back high touch high tech to cover the science component.
- Stream of Dreams this is an expensive initiative, but we could do it for grade 3's each year as a legacy project.
- Will add the Cherry Blossom festival next year at the end of April.
- Health education is done every second year.
- For many events, parents just end up donating items, so there has been a contingency added to the budget, although the cost is likely zero.
- Dundarave tree may be removed next year as it is a lot of work for teachers to organize the decorations before the December 1st deadline.
- Spirit wear was purchased for the teachers this year. There is a budget for any new teachers.
- Literacy RAZ kids costs \$1,200.

- Many books need to be replaced every year due to wear and tear.
- Grade 3 leadership and action club are new items.
- Total expenses operating expenses include hot lunch.
- N. Quilty and S. Slater noted that 82% of the government budget goes to staff salaries.
 18% goes to resources such as paper etc. Our district population is in a stable population most Ministry funds go to growing districts such as Surrey. This is part of the reason the PAC fundraises so much for the school "extras".
- PAC revenue source can be restrictive such as raffle revenue which is under a gaming license.
- Larger donations should be done through school cash online as you get a tax receipt.
- If you make a purchase on the square site the money goes straight to the PAC and can be used right away (same with e-transfers). However, there is a fee to use square.
- iPads last year we purchased a significant amount.
- Next year, the school will need ten new iPads.

The PAC then voted to approve the upcoming school year budget. All were in favour. None were opposed. The 2024/2025 school year PAC budget was approved.

FUNDING FUTURES

The PAC has raised 44% (up from 33% last month) of its goal (\$8,840). Our mission: To raise \$20,000 for school resources and equipment, experts-in-residence programs, student-in-need fund, health education, social and cultural enrichment initiatives and so much more. Thank you to the new sponsorships.

It is woven into the delivery process of the curriculum; it does not take away from the curriculum. There are 130 Indigenous kids in the West Vancouver School district.

June 1st is the start of registration for summer reading club at the library. Cypress Park has won the reading challenge the last few years. The club encourages students to read for 15 min over 50 days of the summer.

Welcome to K was a huge success – thank you to N. Quilty for presenting on behalf of the PAC. There were seventeen families in attendance.

This Friday the grade 3's will visit West Bay. The Cypress Park Grade 4 alumni will tour and have prepared a scavenger hunt.

Next Monday there is a presentation to the district on our FESL. Our goal is around literacy and having inclusive practices in school. A. Anderson and B. Sedgwick will be presenting. Next year we will be back in a one-year cycle and establish a new goal for Cypress Park. We would like parent feedback on the new FESL goal.

Next Friday is Sports Day. There will be Cypress Park alum (grade 7), back to help run the stations.

June 10th there will be a spring concert for parents and families at 2:00pm. The action club will host a lemonade sale right after.

Sports Day will be an early dismissal at 12:05. Parents can start watching at 9:15am that day. Grade 3s will make videos of the new cheers. The videos will be shown to teach the younger grades the new cheers for sports day.
