## **APPROVAL OF MEETING MINUTES**

#### **BUDGET OVERVIEW**

CURRENT YEAR: funds raised to date are \$8,257. This is 22% of our annual goal of \$37,000. This is up 10% from last month. Largest fundraisers this year include the gaming grant, fall fair, funding futures, munch a lunch and VIP parking.

#### FIELD TRIPS VS EXPERTS-IN-RESIDENCE

Reasons why we are leaning towards experts in residence programs:

## Traditional Field Trips:

- 1. Parents asked to individually opt-in and pay out of pocket
- 2. Some students aren't allowed to go consent forms etc.
- 3. It's usually only 1 class that gets to participate
- 4. It's on a single day
- 5. Transportation is surprisingly expensive \$1,000 to rent a school bus for a return trip. Even if we could fit the whole school on a single bus (which is not possible 50-70 seats), at 3 excursions this year so far between and 4 classes that would have added an extra \$3,000 to our costs.

## Experts-In-Residence:

- 1. PAC funded
- 2. All students are able to participate
- 3. We bring the experience to the students and all classes get to participate.
- 4. Our experts are also often brought in for multiple days so that our students get the most out of their new skills and experience.
- 5. By bringing the experts to us, we also save on transportation costs and the time of travel.

Thanks to your generous sponsorships through Funding Futures, this year alone, we've already brought in Andy the Musical Scientist (thanks Bosa family) and Dynamo Fencing (thanks Yada family). Next month, we're excited to bring in Young Actors for 3 session and a French language cooking course by Les Petits Chefs.

These 3 excursions would have tripled our budget alone; therefore, we saved on travel costs and other costs. Teachers will still plan field trips connected to their unit of inquiry. Parents keep asking why there have not yet been any traditional field trips. Can we use parent drivers to keep costs down? Parents need to fill out paperwork and need a minimum coverage for insurance purposes. Is this new this year? We have always done field done fieldtrips. The difference is whether it is parent paid or funded by the PAC. The teachers are also asking for parent experts to come into the classroom to talk about their field of expertise.

#### **DPAC UPDATE**

- Resources coming soon on the DPAC website for PAC events (e.g. carnival games, lunar NY, etc.).
- The Foundry have said they will do 10 min presentations at PAC meetings.
- Their mission is to support young people in living a good life. Offer help around Mental Wellness, Substance Abuse, Life, School, Work and Tough Topics.
- Cypress Park has applied for a \$300 district School Travel Mini Grant.
- If granted, will go towards obtaining and installing "See Me" Flags at the crosswalk on Marine Dr and Morgan Cr.
- Kids can take a reflective flag from a holder on the crossing post and wave it when crossing the street, returning it to the holder on the other side.
- This helps our students in crossing the street safely and is an extra safety measure at a busy street.

#### WHAT IS DPAC

DPAC is an advisory body of parent volunteers who promote parental views to the WV board of education. Acts as a "connector" to parents and PAC to understand what's going on at the broader district level and helps build the learning environment we want for our children. A big thank you to N. #### **ADMIN UPDATE**

We had a successful parent information evening in the gym. S. Slater gave an opening and M. Espenhain gave an intro about IB. Invited parents into their children's classrooms, where they got to meet the teachers and see the classrooms.

There were parent teacher conferences last week. West Bay was at the same time. Admin is open to having feedback on the scheduling as all the calendar planning happens in May. Parents noted that they would prefer to have the 2 schools half days on the same days.

The grade 3 cross country team had a race at Ambleside.

The school hosted an ELL welcome tea for new and returning students.

The students had a practice fire drill in their classrooms.
