# **Information/ House Rule template**

Host Families will discuss their house rules with students when they begin the homestay with their host family. As outlined in the Homestay Agreement, house rules are provided to the student in writing. The rules will be no different for any host children in their family. Host family rules are in place to guide students in their new environment and ensure the safety and wellbeing of the students.

Below is a combined collection. Feel free to copy, paste and add to create your own introduction/ rule sheet. I recommend keeping it short and concise; no more than one page print out in total (print on both sides) to hand out to your new students to discuss.

## Welcome to our home. It is great to have you be part of our family!

We have outlined some guidelines that we feel will be helpful in knowing what is expected of you and from us. If there is anything you do not understand, please ask us – we are here to help you learn our customs and language.

## **COMMUNICATION**

Communication is the key. You must inform us about your whereabouts and when you expect to come back home. You can call, text or What's App our cell phones.

#### **KEYS**

You will have your own key or house code.

Your student must receive a backup key either way.

**Never** lend this key to anyone else or share the code. We expect you to take care of the key and return it to us upon completion of your stay. Please lock doors and windows when you leave the house and take your key.

#### **MEALS**

We hope that you will like Canadian food. We cook all types of different cuisines. If you tell us what foods you like, we will also try to accommodate.

*Water:* Vancouver tap water is safe, drinkable and very delicious.

**Breakfast and Lunch:** In our home, adults and teenagers prepare their own breakfasts. We will help you at first. Please tell us what to buy for your breakfast and school lunch. Lunch will often consist of a sandwich with a piece of fruit and yogurt or sweet treat, such cookies. Leftovers from dinner may be taken for lunch, if desired. Lunch is prepared in recyclable containers which are expected to be returned daily. Do NOT discard these containers.

#### **LAUNDRY**

Please elaborate who is responsible for doing the laundry, how frequent and preferably choose a day that you are assigning for the student's laundry. Please also clarify the changing and washing of the bed sheets (every two weeks common).

#### **SHOES**

Please remove your shoes when you enter the house (house slippers OK).

#### **YOUR ROOM**

Your room is your private space. When you are in your room, you may close the door if you want to be alone. If there is anything that we have forgotten that will make your stay more comfortable, please let us know.

- We encourage you to make your bed every day.
- Your room must be cleaned once per week:
  - Wipe down surfaces with damp clothes (desk, dresser, shelves, windowsills and baseboards, etc.)
  - Vacuum once a week (including under bed, inside closet, edges and corners of room)

## **THE BATHROOM**

I highly recommend a visible print out for the non-disposal of items for the toilet (google image "it is a toilet not a trash can").

•	Please wipe the sink after each use and keep the bathroom tidy.
•	Clean towels

- Showers should not be taken before <u>6:30 am</u> or later than <u>10:00 pm</u> because the noise will disturb other members of the family. Showers must be limited to 10 minutes.
- Please turn the bathroom fan on before using the toilet and starting the shower.
- In Canada, we leave the bathroom door open after we are finished. This will help air circulate and will indicate that the bathroom is available.

## **CURFEWS AND STAYING OVERNIGHT AT A FRIEND'S HOME**

Most Canadian students have curfews. This means that they must be home at night before a certain time. The curfew guidelines are set by the International Programs.

## **TRANSPORTATION**

#### **SAFETY**

Please do not walk alone at night. If you are away from home and do not feel safe, phone home immediately.

#### **TELEPHONE**

If you plan to use the telephone a lot, you should have your own telephone installed. This will cost about \$100. Then the monthly cost will be about \$25 plus charges for long-distance calls.

You can use our phone, but we have rules for use of our telephone:

- No one is to call you before 7am or after 10pm.
- Calls should be limited to 15 minutes. If you wish to make a longer call, please ask us if this is okay.
- All long-distance calls must be placed collect or a long-distance calling card used. Under no circumstances should you make direct dial long-distance phone calls.

#### **GENERAL**

In Canada, we are very conscious of conserving energy. Please remember to turn out the lights whenever you leave a room.

We hope these guidelines will help you to know what to do in our home and to feel comfortable. If there is anything you do not understand, please ask us about it. Remember that we don't understand how things work in your country, so we won't know what you are familiar with and what you don't understand.
