### FAST Program Mr. Dickinson

I would like to congratulate the students in the district's First Aid Swim Training (FAST) program who have now achieved their Bronze Medallion Certification. They have been working since September to learn both the content and techniques, which apply to this course. Their hard work culminated in a multi-day comprehensive skill assessment in December.





FAST is a young lifeguard education program that allows students to develop the essential skills to be successful and confident lifeguards during the course of their regular school day. At the completion of the FAST program students have obtained all of the required certification prerequisites necessary to enroll in the National Lifeguard Course. In addition to developing strong first aid skills, the FAST program also provides students with a practical foundation in resistance and cardiovascular training, swimming, stroke development and leadership.

## Rockridge Film Presents "Longshot—The Brian Upson Story"

Rockridge Secondary Film program is in the process of creating a feature documentary on former SD45 teacher and coach, Brian Upson. For those who are not aware of Brian's story, he was a member of the staff at WVSS for 4 decades and coached the boys basketball program. It was with his passion and leadership that the Highlanders became the most feared and respected basketball program on the North Shore. Brian led the Highlanders to their only provincial basketball championship in 1982, only to pass away after a long battle with cancer just 2 weeks later. As a former Highlander and recipient of the Brian Upson Memorial Trophy, I am proud to be a part of bringing his story to a broader audience.

Film students have contacted the former players, friends and family members to participate in the documentary and have started the process of conducting interviews. I have the utmost confidence that their film will honour Brian's memory and legacy.

The film is set to premiere at the Kay Meek on Friday, February 24, 2017.





Rockridge students were given an opportunity to engage with key courtroom personnel and watch law in action through a variety of trials all at different stages of completion. On November 23<sup>rd</sup>, law students travelled to the SFU downtown campus to attend a youth forum hosted by the BC Civil Liberties Association (BCCLA). Through a series of presentations and workshops including one presented by Aboriginal Leader, Grand Chief Stewart Phillip, students were able to understand why human rights organizations such as the BCCLA are

paramount to a healthy democracy. I truly believe that the best way to make learning in the classroom come alive and develop lifelong connections with skills and content, occurs when students are given the opportunity to step outside the traditional school environment. I look forward to travelling with these students on our future trips in the New Year.


## OUTDOOR CONNECTIONS PE FUNDRAISER



## 2016 CANADIAN INNOVATORS IN EDUCATION AWARDS

Congratulations to Rockridge and Gleneagles Ch'axay teacher-librarian **Ms. Michelle Davis who, along with Rockridge teachers Ms. Lisa Hetman and Ms. Parnaz Kashani** have been selected as the third-place prizewinners in the 2016 Canadian Innovators in Education Awards, sponsored by the Canadian Educators Association and Reader's Digest Magazine. These awards recognize innovative teaching practices in Canadian

Schools. In addition to Rockridge staff, teachers from Caulfeild, Eagle Harbour and Gleneagles Ch'axay Elementary Schools participated in this collaboration.

Ms. Davis, Ms. Hetman, and Ms. Kashani have been recognized for their work in creating makerspaces in the Rockridge Learning Commons (the 21st Century version of the school library). Ms. Davis and her fellow teacher-librarian, Ms. Lilian Trousdell, have created this "library plus" model for Rockridge Secondary, which includes makerspaces.

Rockridge's makerspace resources to date include a 3-D printer, a green screen for filming, and a lego-wall. The lego wall has been particularly popular with students and classes. Recently, a Communications 12 class used the lego wall for an assignment called "What's Your Story?" Students interviewed a relative about a memorable experience in their lifetime and then created a visual representation of the story on the lego wall. Ms. Trousdell and Ms. Davis are now looking forward to adding resources to implement both robotics and sewing makerspaces over the course of the school year.

- 1. Students attend course selection information sessions during Collaboration blocks
- 2. Students speak individually to teachers about next year course selections and expectations
- 3. Counsellors will visit individual classes to provide further information and have students complete a course selection sheet
- 4. If questions still remain:
  - A. Contact counsellors only if needed about program requirements (Graduation, etc.) and post-secondary school pre-requisites
  - B. Speak to the appropriate individuals about specialty programs such as AP (your AP teachers and Mr. McDowell, counsellor), Super Achievers (Mr. Crowley), and Academies (Mr. McDowell or Mr. Crowley)
- 5. Research, research! Look at Post-Secondary programs online, etc.



## WEATHER CLOSURE PROCEDURES

As winter approaches, the likelihood of school disruptions due to snowfall or power outages increases.

The West Vancouver School District will try to keep schools open on every regular instructional day, including those with snowfall.

#### Weather Closure of Schools (Outside School Hours)

Any decision to close schools for the safety of children will be made by the Superintendent.

Parents, students, and staff will be informed of the Superintendent's decision to close schools via:

- the school district website at www.wvschools.ca and
- a Synrevoice email

We will endeavour to communicate this information to parents

#### Weather Closure of Schools (During School Hours)

If weather conditions create a concern for the safety of students returning home, the school principal can decide to dismiss school early after consulting with the Superintendent.

The decision will be communicated to parents and students using the school's normal communication systems (e.g. a Synrevoice message, email).
