Welcome & Call to Order:

6:30pm

- Julie Stewart, Chair, opened the meeting with a Welcome and Acknowledgement of the "Land We Share". We would like to recognize that we are gathered together on the traditional lands of the Squamish Nation and want to thank our friends and colleagues in the Nation who are working with us to guide our understanding of the history of this land and its people. We respect and honor the Elders past, present and future as we bring this knowledge to the students of our community.

Guest Speakers: 6:35pm

Michael Frankowski, Director, International Programs and Rebecca Rowley, Vice Principal delivered a presentation on international programs

West Vancouver Schools has been a leader in international programs for 40 years. Students come from over 25 countries each year for top-class education, inclusivity, Canadian culture, and an unparalleled local experience. Frankowski and Rowley delivered an informal and informative presentation on the international student / homestay programs and opportunities for both international students and the homestay families. They shared details about their recruiting efforts, enrollment over the years and homestay programs.

- WVSD hosted approx. 400 students last year (spread out across the district): Note that K-7 students are hosted with a parent.
- When applications are received, students from China / South Korea / Germany are the first to apply. More funded students are coming into the district due to international instability.
- Rockridge has fewer homestays due to geography.
- There are two types of students: Graduators and Non-Graduators (mostly from Italy, Germany, Spain who are coming for a cultural experience). There are specific requirements for those students who want to graduate in Canada (i.e./ Grade 10-12, English). Students have to meet minimum achievement standards in order to stay enrolled.
- Often, international students help open up new courses and provide new opportunities.
- Orientation program is organized for international students transportation, cultural opportunities, tours around the city, social opportunities; all contributing to a huge uptake in success. In 2022, 156 students participated in September / 53 in February are doing the orientation.
- Most kids are hosted. There is reimbursement for hosting through personal taxes, 2X @ \$1100/student (\$2200 x 10). Up to \$22,000/year.
- Opportunity to provide lifetime connections.
- Lisa Mingo, who hosted a student from Italy in 2021/2022 had a very positive experience and is happy to provide info.
- Teresa Corey has had a number of homestay students (she is now hosting her 10th). *The following questions were asked:*
 - Q. How much can you request in your student preference? Gender / Language? You can list your preferences. Matching is done in April & May. The family is told first which student they are getting. There is no obligation to take them wherever you go.
 - Q. How much does the district receive in revenue per student?
 - A. \$7,885.00/student. From K-9 it's a per student model, but from 10-12, it's a per program model.

Julie Stewart provided the Chair Report:

Teresa Corey, Treasurer, provided the Treasurer's Report:

There are a lot of funds in gaming; fortunate position to be able to support the Outdoor Gathering Space. Mr. Kolkea will support teachers with their Wish List requests, while the PAC will support the Outdoor Gathering Space.

- \$13,000 in general account
- \$30,000 in gaming (just wrote \$20,000 cheque for Gathering Space materials).
- \$140,000 is the total cost (\$55,000 is in trust from previous fundraising).
- Cheque fundraiser will assist with additional funds required to build the Outdoor Gathering Space.

Brochure has been written with all the facts and it is ready to be printed. It will be sent
to Grade 7 families as well, and could be sent to alumni too. Jenny Hippel suggested

communities.

DPAC Report (Kelly Richter):

- DPAC participated in a "Blanket Exercise", guided by Brad Baker, which illustrated the need to be talking about indigenous education delivery in BC schools. (i.e./ there exists an impact of colonialism in BC. A lot of people have no understanding of the history). Parents want to have an opportunity to have the same education as their

children. First Peoples English is now a graduation requirement, and will be offered in Grade 10 and 11.

Traffic & Safety (Kelly Richter):

Every school did a safety assessment. When report back on traffic safety recommendations is returned, it will be reviewed. Jatinder is currently reviewing 17 reports.

A question was raised about whether it is possible to pay for a student to take the bus if they are not within the minimum distance away? *Mr. Kolkea will send the contact to follow up?*

Student Snacks (Debra Hadden):

Student led clubs have a teacher sponsor. Anything that is financially related has to be accessed through the teacher. Any requests can be channeled through Mr. Kolkea.
