F. BUSINESS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES

International and Local Enrolment

Superintendent Kennedy updated registration numbers from our international students, which have not yet recovered from the pandemic. Local enrolment is strong and forecasted numbers next year are expected to be similar to numbers this year.

Summer Learning

Superintendent Kennedy said that enrolment is strong for Summer Learning courses. The secondary school program closes June 17th, allowing time for secondary students to register if needed.

G. BOARD BUSINESS

1. Building Inclusive Transitions to Adulthood

Sandra-Lynn Shortall, Director of Instruction; Heidi DeLazzer, Learning Support Teacher, West Vancouver Secondary School; Declan Innes, Student, West Vancouver Secondary School

Director of Instruction Sandra-Lynn Shortall and WVSS student Declan Innes presented a slideshow highlighting programs that Declan participates in through several community partners. Together they are working on fostering independence and putting tools in place to help with the transition from school to adulthood.

2. Physical Literacy Report

Diane Nelson, Director of Instruction; Amber Pascual & Erin Crawford, Physical Literacy Mentors; Dr. Guy Faulkner, UBC Professor & Chair, Applied Public Health, Kinesiology; & Dr. Alexandra Choi, Medical Health Officer, Vancouver Coastal Heath

Director of Instruction Diane Nelson welcomed several guest speakers to talk about Physical Literacy. The goal is to make movement matter everywhere for everyone through meaningful movement more often. The pandemic contributed to a decrease in physical activity and a sharp increase in screen time, which has resulted in more mental health challenges than seen before. Grade 2 students will be part of a study to report on physical literacy with the aim to have students gain competence in skills, improved self-confidence, consistent self-regulation, forming and sustaining relationships, and improving focus, which can lead to a steady progress academically.

H. COMMITTEE REPORTS

1. Finance & Facilities June 7, 2022 <u>Carbon Neutral Report</u>

Trustee Dave Stevenson spoke to the difficulty that the Facilities department is facing trying to find new and unique ways to achieve carbon neutrality with limited funding.

5 Year Capital Plan

The board approved the Five-Year Capital Plan, which will be sent to the Ministry. The top priority is Sentinel Secondary School, the last building in the district requiring seismic upgrading.

2022/23 Preliminary Budget

Trustee Stevenson spoke to the challenges that will lie ahead next year with regards to the budget. The issues are two-fold; insufficient government funding to cover needs, and locally generated funding not yet recovered from the pandemic. Secretary Treasurer Leiterman said that necessary steps to reduce costs and rebuild reserves will be determined in the fall once the current year financial results are in and actual enrolment for the 2022/23 fiscal year is known. Trustee Brown emphasized that the board needs to advocate for schools so that they have the infrastructure and technological devices needed for teachers to be able to provide academic excellence.

MOTION THAT the Board approve a Bylaw of THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 45 (WEST VANCOUVER) (called the "Board") to adopt the Annual Budget of the Board for the fiscal year 2022/2023 pursuant to section 113 of the *School Act*, R.S.B.C., 1996, c. 412 as amended from time to time (called the "Act").

- 1. The Board has complied with the provisions of the *Act*, Ministerial Orders, and Ministry of Education Policies respecting the Annual Budget adopted by this bylaw.
- 2. This bylaw may be cited as School District No. 45 (West Vancouver) Annual Budget Bylaw for fiscal year 2022/2023.
- 3. The attached Statement 2 showing the estimated revenue and expense for the 2022/2023 fiscal year and the total budget bylaw amount of \$89,311,962 for the 2022/2023 fiscal year was prepared in accordance with the *Act*.
- 4. Statement 2, 4 and Schedules 2 to 4 are adopted as the Annual Budget of the Board for the fiscal year 2022/2023.
